Woman: I am the only one that has seen her do this. And, I can't tell you/won't tell you what she says.


LM: always has a light on and lit. rubs her hands





LM: Banquo's buried, he cannot come out of his grave


Doctor: he can connect the dots of the murders

Menteith: How is Macbeth holding up?

Macbeth has a title that doesn't belong to him, and he finds that he isn't prepared to wear it.

Act 5, Scene 3: Dunsinane. A room in the castle.


Seyton: you don't need anything

D. she has to fix herself






Act 5, Scene 5

Macduff: I plan on killing you anyway

M: I lived a charmed (enchanted) life. I cannot be killed by anyone not born of woman.

Macduff: Well, that's convienent because I was ripped from my mother untimely.

M: Seriously??? I am so not fighting you today.

Macduff: Well then give up, so I can put you on show hanging from a pole with a note that says "Here may you see the tyrant."

Scene 8

M: I will not yield to kiss Malcolm's feet as king. I would rather die fighting. Ready yourself and death be the one that cries "Hold! Enough!"

Macduff kills Macbeth.

Siward finds that his son has been killed as honorably as he could have been. Lord Siward is happy and contented with that.

Macduff hails Malcolm as King of Scotland and offers Macbeth's head for a pike.

Malcolm is generally thankful or the victory and announces that Macduff and the other thanes will become Kingsl
